Fall is here and with the cooler weather comes delicious lettuce, spinach, beets, Swiss chard, kale, carrots, beans, broccoli and cabbage. Our gardeners have been busy preparing the communal and personal plots for fall planting, hosting a workshop, and finishing the shed and shelter.

The garden hosted a Green Spaces Alliance workshop on Oct. 8 about native plants such as milkweed, salvia, coneflowers, and asters, which attract butterflies and other pollinators. The Terrell Heights garden is a way

station for migrating monarchs to feed and lay their eggs.

Thanks to the architecture and construction science students from UTSA and St. Philip's College, our garden now has a lovely shed and shade shelter.
