
JOIN THNA . . . AND HERE'S WHY YOU SHOULD by Kay Kimbell



Improving the Appearance of Terrell Heights

- THNA's Beautification Committee has worked diligently to execute a multi-year plan to clean up and landscape the traffic islands, and continues to maintain the traffic island. The plan was to bring a cohesive design to all traffic islands throughout Terrell Heights. It has taken huge commitment of time and back-breaking labor to make that vision a reality.

Studies show a link between the physical appearance of neighborhoods and crime. When community members work to improve and maintain the physical appearance of their neighborhood, such programs can thwart more crime. The visual cues of an improved neighborhood sends a strong message to both residents and outsiders about community involvement and concern.

A SENSE OF COMMUNITY op-ed by Kay Kimbell

There are a variety of reasons for why people don't or won't join THNA, but two reasons are especially troubling that erode a strong sense of community:

Apathy. In apathy lies failure. While it leads to more problems than I could possibly list here, there is one issuethat should be mentioned. The community suffering from this ailment is ill-prepared to find solutions and take action on complex issues that affect everyone in the community.

The other troubling reason is the perception that THNA doesn't do anything, or doesn't do enough, or does something folks disagree with. That's an unfair assessment of what THNA is and can do. THNA is a very small group of volunteers (folks with families and jobs like the rest of us), and what they can do is largely dictated by the interests, capabilities, and availability of those volunteers. It doesn't seem appropriate to criticize THNA for not doing something if there aren't the volunteers to do it. The solution to the perceived problem is to get involved and help bring about the change you want to see.
